One of China's most exciting young designers, he uses computer software and algorithms to churn out thousands of designs, from which he picks his favorites. The digital roots of this stainless-steel-and-tempered-glass table endow it with an elegant architectural quality not commonly found at this scale.








In Interior: Blue Couch and Green Owl (2016), the artist Mickalene Thomas combines screen printing, woodblock, flocking and digital printing into a collage depicting a mid-century living room. She found the original image in The Practical Encyclopedia of Good Decorating and Home Improvement, a book from the early 1970s on how to design domestic spaces. Thomas's fractured, amalgamated interior examines the collective facades that inform our individual notions of home.




For Art's Sake

Paavo Tynell Ceiling Lamp

This rare ceiling lamp from the 1950s is by Paavo Tynell, the great pioneer and master craftsman of lighting design known as "the man who illuminated Finland." His most famous forms echo the structures of nature, as in this beautifully sculpted light produced by Taito Oy, a company he founded. Tynell often collaborated with the great architects of his day, including Alvar Aalto, for whom he created fixtures for the Paimio Sanatorium and the Viipuri Library.






